MUSIC NOTES

I'm wishing you a very Happy New Year. This January the Soul Matters theme for worship is "Finding Our Center." With that in mind I'd like to invite you to turn inward in a special Taizé worship service and explore creating and supporting quality worship services at a worship training event. I believe that the Taizé tradition can help us in our inner work. And we have the opportunity to "find our center" as a congregation when we join together as a community on Sunday mornings.

On Sunday, January 22nd Cathy Cox and I will lead a worship service in the Taizé tradition. The Taizé community in the Burgundy region of France was founded as an ecumenical monastic order during World War II by Swiss Lutheran Brother Roger Schutz. Its purpose was to create communion and reconciliation, with a devotion to peace and justice through prayer and meditation. The community is still thriving, with thousands from many different countries joining week-long meetings. This style of worship has spread throughout the world. Because of the diversity of nationalities represented, Latin was used as a common language for worship, but everyone is free to use their own language of choice.

To focus worship and prayer, Taizé is a simple style of worship expressed through music and simple rituals. The community believes that singing is an important form of prayer. Taizé songs are meant to be sung over and over, helping all to learn the chants and to allow them to become prayers of the heart. At its best, a Taizé service can suspend time, integrating silence as a vehicle to open our hearts, and use music to be a guide to internal peace. In our practice we will sing in Latin, Spanish, English, and other languages that we may choose. Taizé songs are meant to be accessible for all.

On Saturday, January 28th the Sunday Services Committee will host a Worship Training workshop. Come to explore and share what moves us, and makes for meaningful, memorable worship. This morning is open to all who value Unitarian Universalist worship—from those who have served as service leaders or service associates, to novices who just want to see what goes into planning and creating. All will have the opportunity to sign up for

helping in some way with a service, or even to join our wonderful Sunday Services Committee. Having been part of this group for more than 24 years, I can attest that this work is one of the most fulfilling and fun ways to be of service in our congregation. We will serve a light breakfast and end with lunch together.

Good news from Facilities Management

This has been a very busy year for our committee. In 2022 we:

- Worked with a professional alarm company to equip the campus with a camera system so we can monitor any break-in
- Enhanced the audio/visual in the sanctuary by installing a monitor facing the podium so the speaker and choir could see what is being shown on the audience screens
- Installed a monitor in the lobby so late-comers and overflow crowds will be able to follow the Service
- Kept up the maintenance of the HVAC units
- Worked with HVAC professionals to repair units in the religious education building.
- Added deadbolts to kitchen doors in the religious education building and on the storage sheds to enhance security
- Cleaned out and organized all storage areas and assigned specific uses to each
- Sold a large amount of stuff at the annual Yard Sale.
- Repaired and/or replaced light fixtures throughout the campus for better safety and security
- Began work on an operations manual for the campus
- Placed locks on all external electrical boxes for safety and security purposes
- Cleaned and painted the lobby and the adjoining kitchenette
- Purchased lightweight folding tables for use at dining events

Sunday Services by Charlie Scholz and Katie Fitzgerald – SundayServices@uuchurchlc.org

The Sunday Service Committee has been very successful this year in filling the church calendar with a variety of interesting programs. We are especially pleased with the contributions of individuals, both members of our congregation and outside speakers who, while not on the committee, were nevertheless willing to lead services and/or work as service associates. This has allowed us to present a wide range of topics as well as a variety of religious points of view in our Sunday Worship.

Our initial task, as of January 2022, was to make sure that we had a functioning committee so we could plan worship services. This was enabled by the co-chairing of Katie Fitzgerald and Charlie Scholz, who took responsibility for organizing the group. Other members like Haney Pearson, Brooks Lewis and John Seeley, each contributed their special talents this year to lead services or to work as an associate at various times. (A full list of Sunday Service leaders and topics is archived on the website.)

Catherine Massey, our Director of Music, has been a great supporter of the efforts of the Committee and very helpful in the selection of hymns and videos, leading the choir and encouraging other musicians to fill in when she was not there. In this we especially appreciate the work of Cathy Cox, Mark Sukontarak, Nancy L Anderson, Rich Richins, and Dave and Nancy Carlsons.

Our monthly meetings on Zoom include discussions of topics and assignments for service leaders and associates. We have also made great strides in revising the standard order of service and the service associates' script to reflect current needs. As of June, we took over the responsibility of supervising the audio-visual technical staff that produces our in-person and streaming services.

Request: Spring '23 – Call for Adult Education Instructors

Have an idea for a class you'd like to share with others? You may have many ideas and skills that could be shared. Here's a list of what has been turned in so far: Memoir Writing with Rabbitt Loring, A Taste of Tai Chi with Julie Woody, Silk Painting with Judy Licht, Hats for the Homeless with Sally Atkinson, a book study with Laura Jones, Leadership Refresher with Rev Nancy Anderson, Art with a Math Connection by Sara Thomas, and more still coming in.

UUCLC Adult Enrichment classes will begin in early 2023. Classes could be of all kinds: spiritual, book study, exercise, art, music, writing, cooking, language, etc. They could be offered as long as needed, for example all semester long for exercise, or offered once a week for a month for other subjects, or even just a weekend workshop. The number of sessions is completely up to the instructor's energy and availability. The instructor will get a class list to contact ahead of the first class about materials needed (if any). If materials are needed, the instructor will let participants know the cost involved and where to obtain them.

If you have an idea for a class you'd like to offer, please provide a one paragraph course description. Include a start date, number of classes, start time, end time, class location, minimum and maximum number of participants, and materials needed. Lastly, if open to all ages (like to our religious education kids) add: "Open to all ages."

An instructor proposal form with all the above requirements is available in the church library, or an electronic form can be sent to you by asking Sara Thomas.

Deadline for submitting your class proposals is Jan 10th, but please submit earlier if possible. After Jan 10th, a catalogue of all offerings will be sent in an e-blast to the congregation. Classes will have a charge of \$15 to register, payable to UUCLC.

Classes would be open to the community through word-of-mouth (invite a friend) and possible local postings. This outreach would bring more people in contact with UUCLC. Adult enrichment has many benefits: new skills, fellowship, possible new members, and more visibility for our church.

Request: Give us your yarn!

Yarn collection is ongoing. You may have noticed a large basket in the lobby with a card on the handle marked "Yarn for Hats for the Homeless." One of our Adult Ed classes is collecting yarn of all kinds to make warm hats for the homeless. Please donate your unwanted yarn to this great cause.

Request: Give us your soft plastic!

Religious education is collecting "soft plastic." What is soft plastic you may ask? It's wrappers and plastic packaging of all kinds. Shrink wrap, bread wrappers, produce bags, and chip bags are all examples. You would not believe how much soft plastic actually goes through a household until you start setting it aside in a box or bag to collect it. Then bring in your collected soft plastic to deposit in the bins at church marked for this: one in the lobby and one in the religious education building great room. This will be an ongoing drive for several months for a youth project.

Request: Give us your empty 2-liter bottles!

Religious education wants your empty 2-liter bottles. Both the soft plastic and empty bottles are needed to create building blocks for a youth project. Please help us reduce, reuse and recycle.

Request: Help us to stock the The Little Free Pantry

The UUCLC Little Free Pantry continues to serve the unhoused in our community because ALL people deserve humane treatment and to have their basic needs met. Unitarian Universalists believe in the inherent worth and dignity of all and that it is our moral obligation to provide some of those basic needs.

We need your help. First, we need 2 more volunteers who would help refresh the pantry one day a week. We will gladly show you the procedure and will welcome you to the "Pantry Crew."

Second, feeding the hungry is costly. Food prices have risen so that it is costing us about \$250-300 per month to keep the pantry stocked. Your donations of goods are most appreciated. Alternatively, we are happy to do the shopping for you. You may contribute by check with a note in the memo line that it is for the pantry or donate online to Social Justice and choose the sub-group of Little Free Pantry. If you choose to do your own purchasing, please remember that we are serving the homeless who have no means to cook and store items. They don't even have can openers, so just easy-open tops, prepared soups (not condensed), single-serving sizes, etc. Leave your donations in the little blue wagon in the Library on Tuesdays and Thursdays or in the Lobby Sunday mornings.
