On My Mind

Several years ago I took a motorcycle rider education course and bought myself an old Honda Nighthawk 750. Along the way, I learned some important lessons that apply to ministry.

On a motorcycle, there is no reverse gear. You can't back up. There is only forward motion. (Motorcycles do have a neutral, but you certainly don't want to get stuck there!) In churches, much as we might want to relive the past or bring back the "good old days," it's not going to happen.

Look ahead. Steering a motorcycle is not at all like riding a bicycle. Your eyes do most of the work. Try to see down the road, especially around the twists and turns, as far as you possibly can. The machine almost magically goes wherever you visualize. Fixate on a pothole or a gravelly patch of pavement and that's exactly where your front wheel winds up. Target your vision beyond the next bend and you will find yourself just where you need to be. In congregations, keep your eyes on the open road rather than the obstacles you face.

Riding can be scary. The terrain ahead is unknown. You feel very exposed. The natural reflex is to tighten up and feel anxious. The best way to remain in control, however, is to breathe deep, relax and stay loose on the saddle. Lean into the curves. In church life, remember to enjoy the ride. Don't clench. Give yourself over to the adventure.

My advice for you in Las Cruces going forward is stay safe, glide into the next section of road, and try to have fun. Keep your rubber side down. Ride on!

Church Sound System

In the past two months, the Technical Group has been struggling with Zoom and many sound issues. We are grateful for everyone's patience as we work out these problems. People who tune in on Zoom and have supplied comments about the sound have been critical to helping us pinpoint some of the sources of our problems. We are now working closely with a professional sound engineer and expect that our list of issues will begin to disappear. The engineer is familiar with the make and model of our sound board and other equipment and will continue to work with us on our admittedly complex system.

Some of our issues have to do with the latest release of Zoom, which unknown to us, treats music as background noise that should be deadened. With tongue in cheek, we must say that they did a fine job and we are adjusting our settings as necessary. We had an issue with one of the signal splitters used to deliver A/V to the entire church audience, including Zoom. We now have two backup splitters available if one fails. Finally, we've been told by the

engineer that our mics are very "live" that they actually can overpower one another. That's another way of saying our mics are very sensitive. That's not a bad thing but it does mean that we will be coordinating the mics in a different way.

Be assured that we have a host of people working to resolve what turns out to be cascading issues.

Church Calendar

Please take a look at the new, and we hope, improved church calendar. You can access it from the home page of the website in the lower left quadrant where you will see three large buttons: Ahead This Week, Ahead This Month, and Events Calendar. The calendar is also available on many webpages in the right sidebar.

The new color coded calendar will make it easier to see what's happening in the church. There is also a convenient search feature. Everything is explained to help you find what you're looking for. Color coding was suggested by Rev. Sickafoose.

If you want to see what church events are occurring as a result of the upcoming 2023 Auction, just enter A: in the search box. Auction events are preceded with A:. Many of them are already entered in the calendar, but there are more to come.

Scams

I've been receiving regular notices from the Social Security Administration about current SSA and SSDI scams. From other sources I've received warnings about current and upcoming tax scams. In addition, I receive regular email scams from many places where I routinely shop: CVS, Home Depot, Best Buy, Best Buy's Geek Squad (which I've never used), and Target. These scams look uncomfortably convincing. For example, the Home Depot email had all the right logos, graphics, and a very realistic ad. There was also a large picture and the "offer" was to "click here and claim your new [whatever]." That's called Phishing and the goal is for me to open the link which will do one of several things, none of them pleasant. The link could drop ransomware onto one of my devices thereby disabling it until I literally pay the price to regain access. The link could drop a virus that will cause the device to behave very badly and likely I'll end up taking it to a specialist to have it cleaned up. In other cases, the link could drop a keylogger into my computer, which will record all of my keystrokes, including passwords and other personal information, and forward them to the scammer. There's more but you get the idea. Click here if you want to visit an FBI site and learn more about Phishing, Vishing, Smishing, and Pharming, which are some of the varieties of scams you can look forward to this spring and summer.

Email Hacking

Your email address is the gateway to your world. If a hacker gets into your email, you'll have big problems. Note: just using your email address without your permission is bad, but it is not the same as hacking *into* your email box. The first thing you should know is that email addresses are easy to get hold of, they're everywhere, and that includes all of the church's business email addresses. But while getting an email address is very easy, getting an email password should be very, very hard. The first thing you should do to protect yourself is use a complex email password. I know that people hate passwords in general and complex ones even more so but really, would you duct tape your front door closed when you leave home instead of using a key? A great password consists of 8 or more upper and lower case letters, numbers, and special characters. Password management software can help and is often free. I don't recommend using your computer's operating system or your browser to store passwords, although they really want to. Why not? Because the next time you take your computer in for service, you will be handing over all of your locally stored passwords. Use a password manager that operates in the cloud; i.e., on the Internet, not on your local device.

One suggestion for developing a complex password is to include an easy to remember phrase with some numbers, letters and special characters. We used passwords like this on government servers: 3rd-redskinswillwinthisyear or 2000dinosaursarepeopletoo. Granted, we didn't need to access the servers very often so you'll probably want a shorter password. A loved one's obscure middle name preceded by a birth month and followed by a birth year and for good measure stick a couple of !! on the end — JuneEsmer1922! or H@ns0n1922!! or !!Mason1916!! Finally, change your password as often as you're willing. Every 6 months is acceptable IF you use a complex password. Here is an excellent little video I hope you'll watch because it describes the signs of a true email hack as well as phishing and other nasty things. It's under 5 minutes. Fair warning, it is a promotional video but the facts outweigh the inconvenience of the advertising, which is reasonably low key.


The Sixth Source of Affirmation of the Unitarian Universalist Association

The holiday celebrates spring at its peak and the coming summer. Beltane also sometimes goes by the name May Day. It is a celebration of fertility in the literal sense, for the many things we can accomplish in our lives, and dreams that can become reality. In many Pagan traditions a May Pole dance is held in celebration.

Our Maypole will be erected and the dance will begin after the Beltane service on April 30, join us. Many hands make the work light and we will all be less dizzy!

You are invited to join CUUPS on April 15 at 6 PM. We begin with a potluck at 6:00 and ritual at 7:00. Come meet our CUUPS members, bring a dish and, if you like, stay for the ritual. Join us, you'll need a break from tax preparation!



Wheel of the Year

Yule: Celebrates the winter solstice.

Imboc: An ancient festival welcoming the first wave of spring.

Ostara: Celebrates the spring equinox

Beltane: Celebrates May Day

Litha: Celebrates the summer solstice

Lughnasadh: Celebrates the beginning of the harvest season

Mabon: Celebrates the autumnal equinox

Samhain: Marks the end of summer, and the end of the harvest season. It signals the beginning of winter. On this day, pagans believe the veil between the living and the dead is especially thin.

The Covenant of Unitarian Universalist Pagans (CUUPS) is an organization dedicated to networking Pagan-identified Unitarian Universalists (UUs), educating people about Paganism, promoting interfaith dialogue, developing Pagan liturgies and theologies, and supporting Pagan-identified Unitarian Universalist religious professionals.

The Covenant of Unitarian Universalist Pagans (CUUPS) was chartered by the Unitarian Universalist Association at the General Assembly in 1987 for purposes of enabling:

- networking among Pagan Identified UUs; providing outreach of Unitarian Universalism to the broader Pagan community continentally.
- providing educational materials on Paganism for Unitarian Universalist congregations and the general public.
- promoting Pagan Jewish & Christian dialogue; encouraging the development of theo/alogical and liturgical materials based on earth and nature centered religious and spiritual perspectives.
- encouraging greater use of music, dance, visual arts, poetry, story, and creative ritual in Unitarian Universalist worship and celebration.
- providing support for Pagan-identified Unitarian Universalist religious professionals and ministerial students; and *fostering healing relationships with our mother the Earth and all her children*.

from it. Menakem introduces the concept that racism is not only in our heads, how we think, but also in

our bodies, as a wound that can be healed. The intergenerational trauma of white supremacy affects us

all as a deep, personal soul injury, a visceral pain that must be acknowledged if we are to achieve racial

justice and healing. Intellectually stimulating and practical, *My Grandmother's Hands* is described by

Robin DiAngelo as "a revolutionary work of beauty, brilliance, compassion and ultimately, hope." Come check it out.

Does your group have a request for the library to acquire? Last month, we highlighted *The Green Amendment: The People's Fight for a Clean, Safe, and Healthy Environment* by Maya K. van Rossum. It is

Change for Change

The Change for Change recipient for the second quarter (April through June) of 2023 is Border Servant Corps. This charitable organization operates a Hospitality Center to help asylum-seekers get to their

sponsors in the U.S. Migrants usually only spend one or two nights at the center. As they exit the ICE buses that bring them to Las Cruces, it is their first breath of freedom in this country and is a very special

moment for them, the Center staff, and for the volunteers. At least 8 members of this congregation volunteer at the Center.

FEMA and Homeland Security provide funding for basic services. Your Change for Change donations will be used for items not supported by federal funding such as books, toys and playground equipment for the children. More than 11,000 children and their families (more than 32,000 people) from more than 50 countries around the world were served by Border Servant Corps in 2022.

The Climate Action Group (CAG) had a busy legislative season, trying to understand and promote those bills which most addressed the climate crisis. Obtaining information was a major hurdle, and we are still

trying to figure out which bills passed! Unfortunately it seems that only 1 of the 11 bills we were tracking actually passed, SB 8 GEOTHERMAL RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT. We will have more definitive news soon.

We have spent much of the last month transitioning toward other projects. A number of us attended meetings of Unitarian Universalist Association Green Sanctuary, Interfaith Power and Light, Climate Reality Project, Cool Congregations, etc., gathering information about this process. That kind of research will continue, but we also look forward to implementing some of the recommendations, and are looking for volunteers, for instance to measure buildings, gather data, etc., so we can benchmark our energy usage.

We are also exploring other possible projects and activities. Mark Sukontarak and Ginny Herrick have been busy deciding on and procuring our auction items (an induction burner, a diffusion plate, and a skillet). I will staff a booth at the auction. Charlie Welch has been trying to tame the monster that is our El Paso Electric billing and contracts, and Shirley Davis worked on this before, as did I. There is some progress!

Cathy Cox, Jane Asche, and I presented a summary of CAG activities to Social Justice and to the Community Roundup, broaching the idea of a Green Sanctuary and asking for support. The response was positive. I contacted a local energy audit company, which recommended that we wait until April, when the Inflation Reduction Act rules should be clearer. We are looking into grants, and are planning to coordinate with the Facilities Committee on the work toward a Green Sanctuary.

We have organized another Roundtable—Don Kurtz, an author and professor and one of the motivating

forces behind the PowerUp exposition, will present on April 30 at 2:00. The talk is entitled "Electrify

Everything: Four and a half personal decisions that will save the planet."
